War Memorials Trust is pleased that the Minister for Crime Prevention has specifically chosen to visit a war memorial as part of his consideration of the issue of metal theft.

Amy Davidson, one of War Memorials Trust's Conservation Officers, commented on the current situation "War Memorials Trust supports any attempt to deter metal theft and we are delighted that the number of theft, attempted theft and vandalism cases reported to us has reduced by two-thirds since their peak in 2011. However, it is important that we do not become complacent as there are still an alarming number of thefts taking place so the challenge is now for everyone to work to reduce this number further."

Amy Davidson met with the Minister at the war memorial located on Church Manorway, Erith, Kent dedicated to the employees of the former Callender's Cables and Construction Company Ltd killed in both World Wars. It is part of the enduring legacy of the memorial that the 'proud and grateful memory' referred to on the memorial is honoured by former employees who still lay wreaths at the memorial and generally keep an eye on it. Sadly this memorial was one of fifteen reported to the Trust as having been targeted by thieves so far this year. An attempt was made to pull away one of the metal plaques on the memorial which carries the inscriptions. Thankfully, in this case there were people to notice that a theft attempt had been made. The former employees that tend to the memorial ensured an application was made to the In Memoriam 2014 project to have SmartWater applied to help prevent any further theft attempts in the future.

Unfortunately, in some cases there is no custodian for a memorial or those who take an interest in their welfare and it is in these cases where memorials face the greatest risk.
