Call to remember: the state of the nation's war memorials and how you can help

With the centenary of the First World War approaching now is an opportunity to reflect on the state of the nation's war memorials.

War Memorials Trust (WMT), the national charity that works for the protection and conservation of war memorials, is issuing a 'Call to remember'. It is asking people across the country to look at their war memorials and check their condition. If any works are required WMT can support communities and ensure appropriate methods are used to repair and conserve them. Interest in war memorials will grow through the centenary and it is vital communities understand how long conservation projects can take and what they involve so works are not rushed and damage caused. In the next few years more and more people will want to see war memorials fit for the many for the commemorative events and services that will take place.

To help us all understand the state of our war memorial heritage, data collected in the last year indicates that:

- Up to 10% of war memorials across the UK may be in 'Poor' or 'Very bad' condition. These need to be identified so advice and available funding can be offered to custodians and communities to improve condition. It is still early days for the project and we know there is a focus on those in 'Poor' or 'Very bad' condition so it is anticipated that percentage will fall
- Incidents of war memorial vandalism have increased but cases of theft have fallen.

- Grant interest is growing as more communities are looking at their war memorials and undertaking work. So far in 2013 War Memorials Trust has helped 76 war memorials share grant funding of £164,377

To help improve this understanding, and ensure we protect our war memorials, the public can contribute to building up a clearer picture. People across the UK can:

- Add details of their war memorials to War Memorials Online, www.warmemorialsonline.org.uk. This website, created with the support of English Heritage, is asking the public to share information on their local war memorials. Details of over 12,000 war memorials have been gathered in its first year and WMT is calling on the public to ensure their war memorial is included and its condition noted to help improve our understanding of the condition of war memorials
- Obtain free SmartWater to deter metal theft through the In Memoriam 2014 project, <u>www.inmemoriam2014.org</u>

• Engage **young people** with their war memorial heritage by using resources available from WMT's Learning Programme, www.learnaboutwarmemorials.org, which will help ensure tomorrow's war memorial custodians will continue to preserve our war memorial heritage

Frances Moreton, War Memorials Trust's Director said: "The information being generated by the public through War Memorials Online is starting to provide clear evidence of the state of the nation's war memorials and enables WMT, and others, to provide advice and target funding at those war memorials that need attention. WMT's 'Call to remember' asks people across the UK to upload information to War Memorials Online and share details of their local war memorials at <u>www.warmemorialsonline.org.uk</u>. Whether highlighting problems or celebrating those war memorials which are cherished you can help us to understand the condition of war memorials and ensure that all are in the best possible condition. It would be wonderful if all our First World War memorials were in a 'Good' condition by the 11th November 2018 to ensure we can all pay our respects to those who are remembered upon them."

Notes to editors

- 1. War Memorials Trust is an independent registered charity. Established in 1997 due to concerns about neglect and vandalism it works to protect and conserve war memorials. It provides advice, information and administers grants schemes that assist the repair and conservation of war memorials across the UK. As a charity the Trust relies on voluntary contributions to undertake its work. Supporters include annual and life members, donors, charitable trusts and corporate contributors.
- 2. War Memorials Online is a website seeking to create a greater understanding of the condition of war memorials. Due to the interest in war memorials generated by the centenary of the First World War this is a wonderful opportunity for everyone to help. Anyone can upload images, add condition updates, contribute information and raise concerns about war memorials at <u>www.warmemorialsonline.org.uk</u>. Any concern raised, or memorial reported in 'Poor' or 'Very bad' condition, is passed to War Memorials Trust

to follow up. This will ensure available funding and support is targeted at memorials, and their custodians, in greatest need of help.

War Memorials Online is managed by War Memorials Trust with the support of English Heritage. It is working with other organisations to share information to support war memorial protection and conservation across the UK.

At 10th November 2013 the website has seen 12,500 records added or edited in its first 12 months. With an estimated 100,000 war memorials we need more people to get involved to complete the picture.

- 3. In Memoriam 2014 will protect memorials at risk of theft or damage by marking them with a forensic liquid called SmartWater. The crime prevention fluid, which is being made available at no charge, will not only make memorials uniquely identifiable, it also offers robust traceability should a theft occur. This will act as a significant deterrent to those considering desecrating our war memorials by massively increasing their chances of detection and subsequent arrest. The **Small Grants Scheme** is WMT's scheme open to any type of war memorial anywhere in the UK. All funds for this scheme are raised from individuals, charitable trusts etc. The scheme has seen an increase in both offers and offer value of 10% in just the first three quarters of the year.

The **Grants for War Memorials** scheme has four annual deadlines per year. Half way through the year, after two meetings, the scheme is on course to make a larger number of offers with a higher offer value than in the previous year.

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WMT is also administering the **Centenary Memorials Restoration Fund** on behalf of Historic Scotland. This scheme launched in April 2013 and the first batch of offers will be announced in November 2013. Further details will be made available as soon as an announcement is made.

However, we are not a photo library and whilst we will endeavour to provide images this cannot be guaranteed as many of the images sent to the Trust are not accompanied by a copyright licence.
- 8. War Memorials Trust runs a Learning Programme for young people, launched in 2011. The Trust's learning website <u>www.learnaboutwarmemorials.org</u> provides lesson plans and resources for schools and project ideas and activities for members of youth groups and the Trust's Learning Officer offers visits to schools to lead sessions and workshops for young people. These resources have been well received and used.
- 9. War Memorials Trust has had a membership since around 2000. Annual members pay £20 per annum with lifetime members contributing £100. Joint memberships are available and the charity has a gift membership scheme for those who would like to give the gift of membership to a family member or friend.
- 10. War Memorials Trust has approximately 180 Regional Volunteers, members of the charity who act as local contacts. They raise awareness of the charity and also alert the charity to local war memorial issues.
